## Jay G. Hayden II, 1940-2006

Jay G. Hayden II died May 20, 2006, in Portland, ME, after a struggle with pulmonary fibrosis. He received a lung transplant in August 2004 at the Cleveland Clinic, for which he and his family were extremely grateful.

He was born April 9, 1940, in Grosse Pointe, MI to Martin Scholl and Elizabeth Dodds Hayden. Jay spent his childhood in Michigan and Washington, DC. He graduated from Hill School in Pottstown, PA and then went to Harvard College.

He received his MD at Yale Medical School. As an anesthesiologist, Jay held a number of jobs.

Jay is survived by his wife, Judy Perley, daughter, Lisa and her husband

Jeff; his son, Nelson and his wife Gloria; his son, Sam; his daughter Lystra; and his son, Jay. He is also survived by his former wife, Nancy Hayden; his brother, Martin and his wife Anne; his sister-in-law, Karyl; his grandchildren, Josh, Sabrina and Gabrielle; and his nieces and nephews, Dodds, Tory, Kelly, Kacy, Margaret and Rosamond. He was predeceased by his parents; his brother, John and his niece, Anna.

Jay will always be remembered as a bright and inquisitive man, who was infallibly kind and generous.

An active member of the Episcopal Church since childhood, he sang in the choir at the National Cathedral in Washington as a boy. More re-

cently he was a member of Christ Church in Cambridge, MA; St John's Church in Portsmouth, NH; and St. Peter's by-the-Sea, in Cape Neddick, where he served as the President of the Board of Trustees.

Jay had many passions. He was a varsity swimmer in high school and college. He was an enthusiastic diner and chef. His fine cooking made gatherings with his family and friends particularly special. For years, he baked bread for his family.

He had many other interests as well. He played the flute and classical guitar. He rowed scull; he owned a boat; he raised orchids and tropical fish. He was a voracious reader and Judy and Jay loved to travel.
